

Spring Forward

The Wood SWCD is springing forward. Conservation events for youth and adults, agricultural cost share conservation programs, ditch projects, tree seedling and fingerling fish sales. The Wood SWCD assessed over 30 miles of ditches currently being cleaned through private ditch cleanouts. With the H2Ohio initiative rolling out in 2020, it is the most recent and largest of the district's agricultural conservation cost share programs. Many of the events and programs have become tradition, too, in the soil and water districts' world. Tree seedling sales encourage windbreaks to curb erosion and promote wildlife habitat. Fingerling fish sales help to stock local farm ponds used for drinking water.

The district board of supervisors and staff work together with local state and federal agencies as well as local producers, educators, citizens, and landowners to address local natural resource issues and priorities. To make the greatest impact with the available staff and funding, the group looks at past and current work being done with the struggles and successes. The group works to identify potential issues and establish potential solutions, prioritize and rank the criteria used to address the issues, and discuss where the best investment can be made with the natural resource concerns.

Strengthening conservation education and awareness for youth and adults is a key strategy to improving soil health and water quality, while at the same time presents a big challenge. Reaching the public in an effective and efficient manner does not have a simple solution.

Since 1949 the Wood County Soil and Water Conservation District serves the residents and landowners in conservation of the local natural resources. Our daily life activities all rely on healthy soils and healthy water. Your comments and suggestions are helpful and welcome. This past July I had a chance to take a bucket list trip to Africa which had to wait until my retirement.

The vastness of the land and the countless variety of African animals is something that I will never forget. The days were made up of driving and then stalking animals into camera range. From tree and scrub covered valleys to huge plains the animals just appeared, sometimes a single animal and many times large herds running from one place to another. Who knows what motivated them to move and some species just like running. My pictures will remind me forever of this tremendous adventure.

But what struck me most was the admiration of America and questions about politics we are currently experiencing. During my trip I learned about just how important the prosperity of American is as it trickles down to smaller countries around the world. When the U.S. succeeds, it lifts up the rest of the World. At the camp that I was they said that Americans represented about 90% of their customers. When Covid hit, they were shut down for over 18 months and almost went bankrupt but thankfully were able to stay open for business until the Covid restrictions were lifted.

The area of South Africa that I visited was settled by mostly Dutch descendants at about the time of our Civil War as settlers traveled by Ox cart through this immense country. Sheep and cattle were grazed on the lands and fences are still in place where they once roamed. In recent years through massive conservation efforts African wild game now roams areas where their numbers were once very limited. They have replaced sheep and cattle in many areas and the fences are still up only this time it is to keep the sheep and wild game separate. The revenue from the wild African animals now supports many more families, reduces rampant poaching and harvested animals feeds local villagers and supplies markets with meat.



South Africa was once a very prosperous country with great infrastructure and a vibrant economy with the backdrop of Apartheid tarnishing it's reputation. Today it is a nation with "load sharing" (we might call them scheduled brownouts) and a struggling infrastructure that no longer provides enough electricity nor public water to serve it's citizens. Where railroads once crossed the country, I understand that only one small portion remains. Nevertheless, my experiences with all the people were excellent and I would instantly grab a chance to visit again and experience a place like no other on earth.

Soil Testing...get the scoop on your soil

Make the most of your time, energy, and dollars spent in your garden and yard by knowing the health of your soil. The Wood SWCD and Wood County OSU Extension have basic soil test kits available from Penn State Extension for \$10.68 each (includes sales tax). The standard fertility report for home vegetable, fruit, and flower gardens, turf, and landscape plants includes results for pH, acidity, Mehlich 3 phosphorus, potassium, calcium, and magnesium and lime and fertilizer recommendations. Additional testing is available for additional fees through Penn State Extension.

The Agricultural Incubator Foundation 13737 Middleton Pike, Bowling Green has organic and conventional garden plots available for a seasonal fee. Plots range in size from a 4'x8' raised bed




to a 40'x40' plot and range in cost from (\$20-\$75). Water and a storage shed are provided. The application, contract, and guidelines at agincubator.org.

Is a Nutrient Management Plan SMART for Your Farm?

Voluntary Nutrient Management Plans (VNMPs) play a big part in many state and local government programs like H2Ohio and EQIP, and will likely continue to for years to come. But you don't have to participate in a program to benefit from developing your own VNMP.

USDA estimates that with fertilizer costs more than doubling in 2022, that farmers can save nearly \$30 per acre, on average, on land currently receiving excess nutrients by implementing a nutrient management plan (NRCS 590 Conservation Practice Effects – 08/25/2022). Although these



programs are often implemented with conservation in mind, a nutrient management plan can help reduce input costs, maximize yields, and manage your nutrients more efficiently. So, not only are VNMPs good for the environment, they also help to support your bottom line.

USDA's SMART Nutrient Management includes the 4Rs of nutrient stewardship- right **Source**, right **Method**, right **Rate**, and right **Timing**; with an emphasis on smart activities to reduce nutrient loss by **Assessment** of site-specific conditions.

Want to get started? We're here to help! Many producers avoid developing nutrient management plans because they have the reputation of being time consuming or difficult to understand, but there's a ton of resources and tools available that help to make it simple. You'll need soil tests less than three years old, the planned crop, and a yield goal to get started. Contact your local Soil and Water Conservation District, NRCS, OSU Extension agent or 4R Certified Ag Retailer for assistance!

Coming Soon: H2Ohio Enrollment

As we come to the final year of the original H2Ohio signup, the next round H2Ohio enrollment will be coming soon to Wood County. Enrollment will be open to all producers!

Many of the H2Ohio practices will be updated based on feedback from producers and others. The goal of the program will still be phosphorus reduction, but with a more streamlined approach for easier delivery and program participation.

Some planned changes are;

- Incorporating VRT into Voluntary Nutrient Management Plans, with different cost share amounts for Basic Voluntary Nutrient Management Plans and Precision Voluntary Nutrient Management Plans.
- Combining Small Grains, Forage, and Cover Crop practices under one Overwintering Cover standard.
- Offering a broader range of application methods and dates for Manure Incorporation and Utilization, especially benefitting producers who
 use a no-till approach.
- Developing incentives in fertilizer application practices that will focus on management of nutrients, not just nutrient application
- The integration of H2Ohio MyFarms; a web-based application for agreement management, plan development, documentation submission, progress tracking, and more.

ODA staff are still in the process of finalizing some of these changes, but developing and following a Voluntary Nutrient Management Plan will remain the foundation of the program. The next enrollment for H2Ohio is expected to begin in Summer of 2023.

What can you to prepare for H2Ohio enrollment? Get organized!

- Make sure your soil tests for fields you plan to enroll are less than 4 years old (2021 or newer).
- Have a rough plan of what you intend to plant for crop year 2024.
- Think about what practices will work with your operation.
- Start your manure plan. If your operation produces more than 350 tons or 100,000 gallons or manure annually, you will need a Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plan (CNMP) to participate in H2Ohio. We can help you develop this plan, but please contact us as soon as possible to get the processes started.

Most importantly; contact Sarah St. John or Beth Landers to being added to the H2Ohio communication list to stay informed about future meetings and enrollment dates.

From the Farm Meetings

Wood county producers met in February and March for Wood SWCD's "From the Farm" meetings held at Buffalo Wild Wings in Bowling Green. The purpose of the meetings is to get area farmers and Wood SWCD staff together for casual conversations on current topics of interest in the agricultural community.

In February the group heard from BGSU Assistant Professors Dr. Vazquez-Ortega and Dr. Soto-Lopez about their research on beneficial re-use of dredge material from Toledo Harbor and the effects of lake dredged sediment on soil health. They presented their research, answered questions and discussed concerns from the group, and talked about ideal characteristics of field sites for the next phase of their research.

With spring planting just around the corner, OSU Extension educator Nick Eckel was the guest speaker at the March meeting. He shared some research and discussed planting corn and soybeans ahead of cold fronts and how soil temp, moisture, and timing can affect crop yields.

After taking a break this spring for planting, we plan to resume the monthly meetings in July. In the warmer months we like to hold the meetings at different farms around Wood County. If you're interested in attending or hosting one of the meetings at your farm and would like to be included on any future communication, please contact us! The meetings are free and open to the public.
